Scoutmaster/SPL Breakfast



History of The Feather Name

1965 - Feather - - Names We will assume that 1965 was the first year of an official type of newsletter for the lodge. That's only because we can verify 1986 as the 25th year of a newsletter. Officially, we cannot verify the name of the newsletter until 1978. We are still searching records but below is what we have verified. Perhaps it was called the Naguonabe Bulletin because the national newsletter was called the Bulletin. 1978

ARCHIVE

This claw is to be put on a necklace with your year beads. What are year beads? There is a sequence of five beads for each year, put this on your necklace with your claws. This system is something to show how active you are. There is not another one like this in the rest of the United States. So start yours. This is something special in one lodge different from any other lodge. Something else added to the claws concerns the Winter Conclave. If the weather for the conclave is at least -25F both nights and/or six inches of snow fall between 6 p.m. Friday to 10 a.m. Sunday you may paint your claw whites. Only the claw!! If you sleep out when it is -25F you can paint a dark blue tip on your claw 1/4 inch up. If you sleep outside for a combinations of -50F you can paint the tip dark blue and add a blue strip. Combination of -75F -- blue tip - - two stripes. Combinations of -100F


